

# Alberta Seniors, Community and Social Services Open Data

## Income Support (IS)

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### Program Overview

Income Support (IS) provides financial benefits to individuals and families in Alberta who do not have the resources to meet their basic needs, including food, clothing, and shelter.

The data presents households receiving support payments for a specific month and presents the average monthly caseload from December 2005 to the present. A household could consist of one or more members and the composition of the caseload is made up of single individuals, lone-parent families, couples with children and couples without children.

Income Support open data was first published in September 2015 and is presented as a portion of the entire Alberta population. The data describes the actual average caseload volume each month as well as by fiscal year. The data is updated in the third week of the month and includes the following measures:

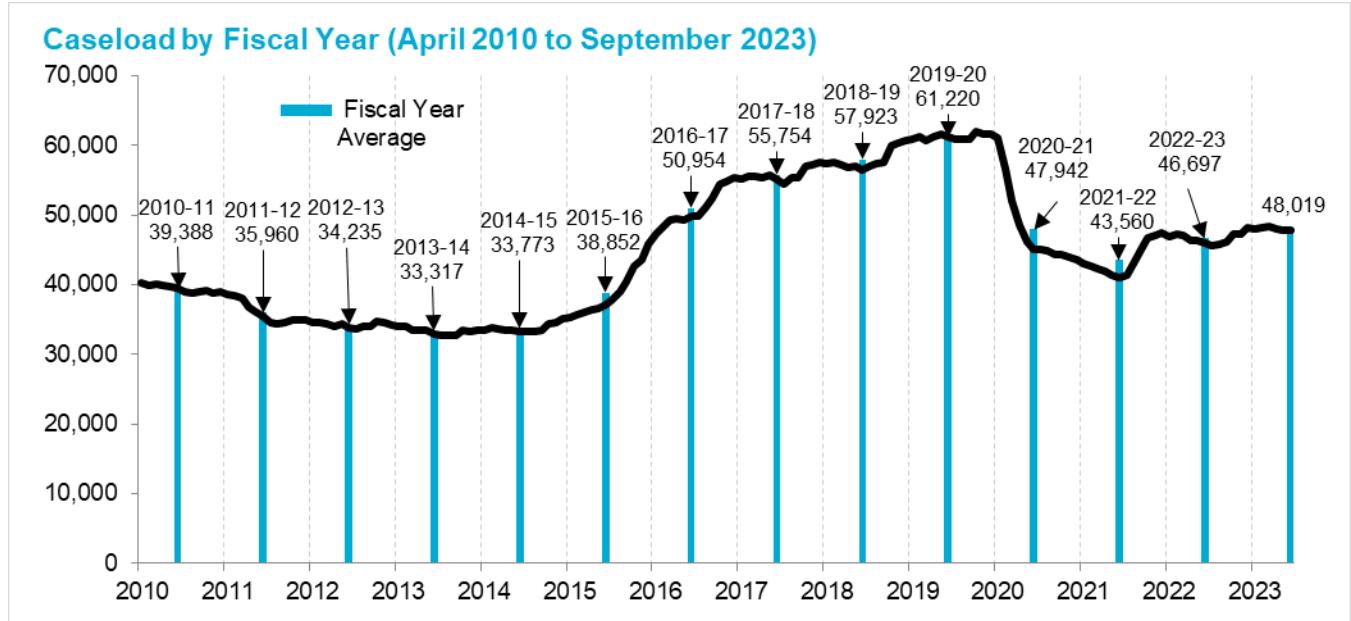

## Data Summary for September 2023

### Caseload by Fiscal Year (April 2010 to September 2023) [\[back to top\]](#)

The Income Support Caseload<sup>1</sup> for September 2023 was 47,778; with 0.0% decrease from the previous month.

- From September 2022 to September 2023, the Income Support Caseload showed an increase of 4.0%.



**Note:** All regions report that the primary factor for reduced Income Support caseloads for December 2020 to October 2021 is due to Albertans accessing the federal government's Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB).

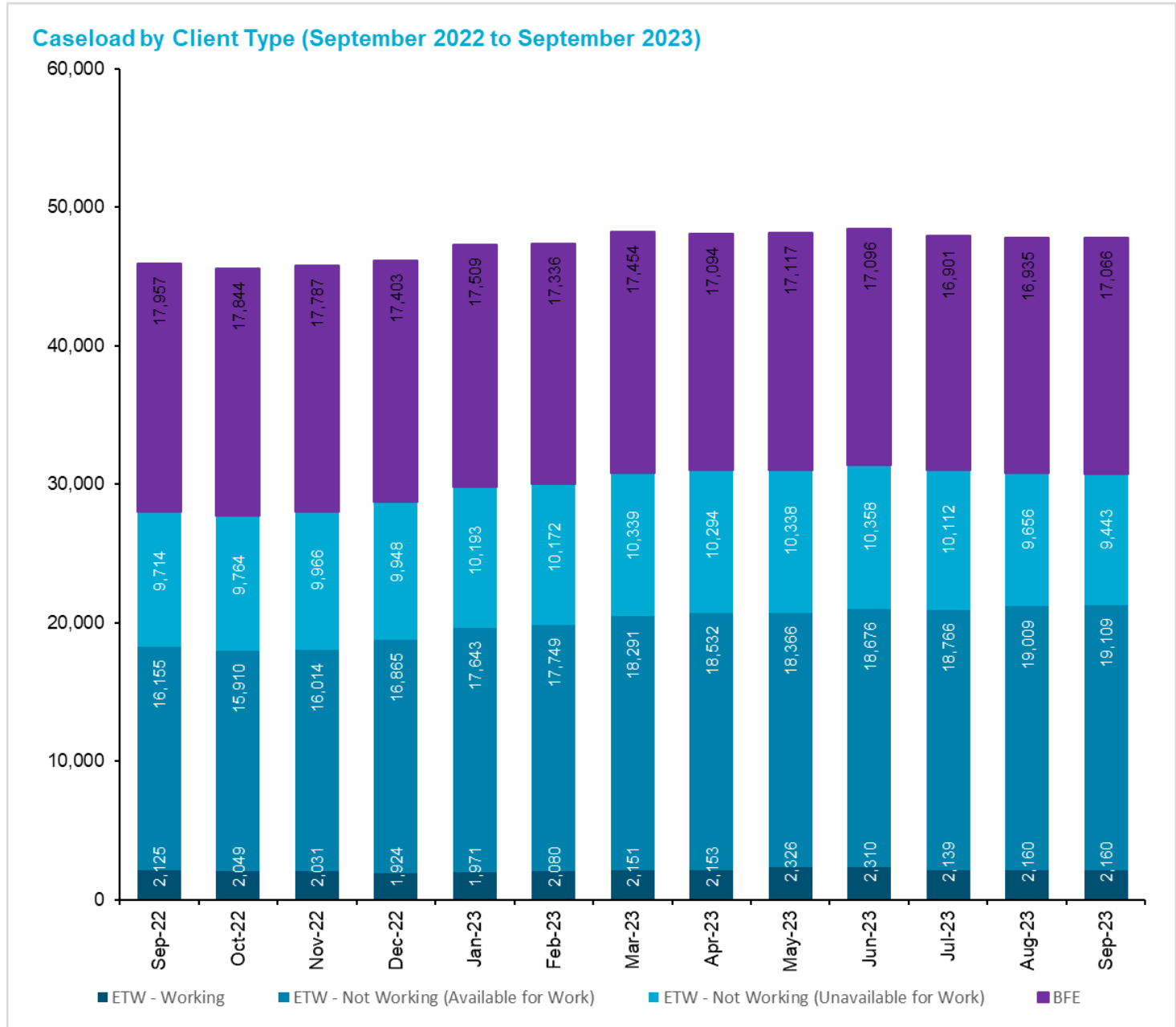

<sup>1</sup> A caseload is the number of households categorized as Expected to Work (ETW) or as having Barriers to Full Employment (BFE) during a specific reporting period. A household comprises one or more family members. People who need upgrading or training so they can get a job (Learners) December also receive Income Support, but they are not included in this dataset.

## Caseload by Client Type (September 2022 to September 2023) [\[back to top\]](#)

The caseload by Client Type for September 2023 showed Albertans who were Expected to Work (ETW) represented 64.3% of the total IS caseload of 47,778, while Barriers to Full Employment (BFE) represented 35.7%.

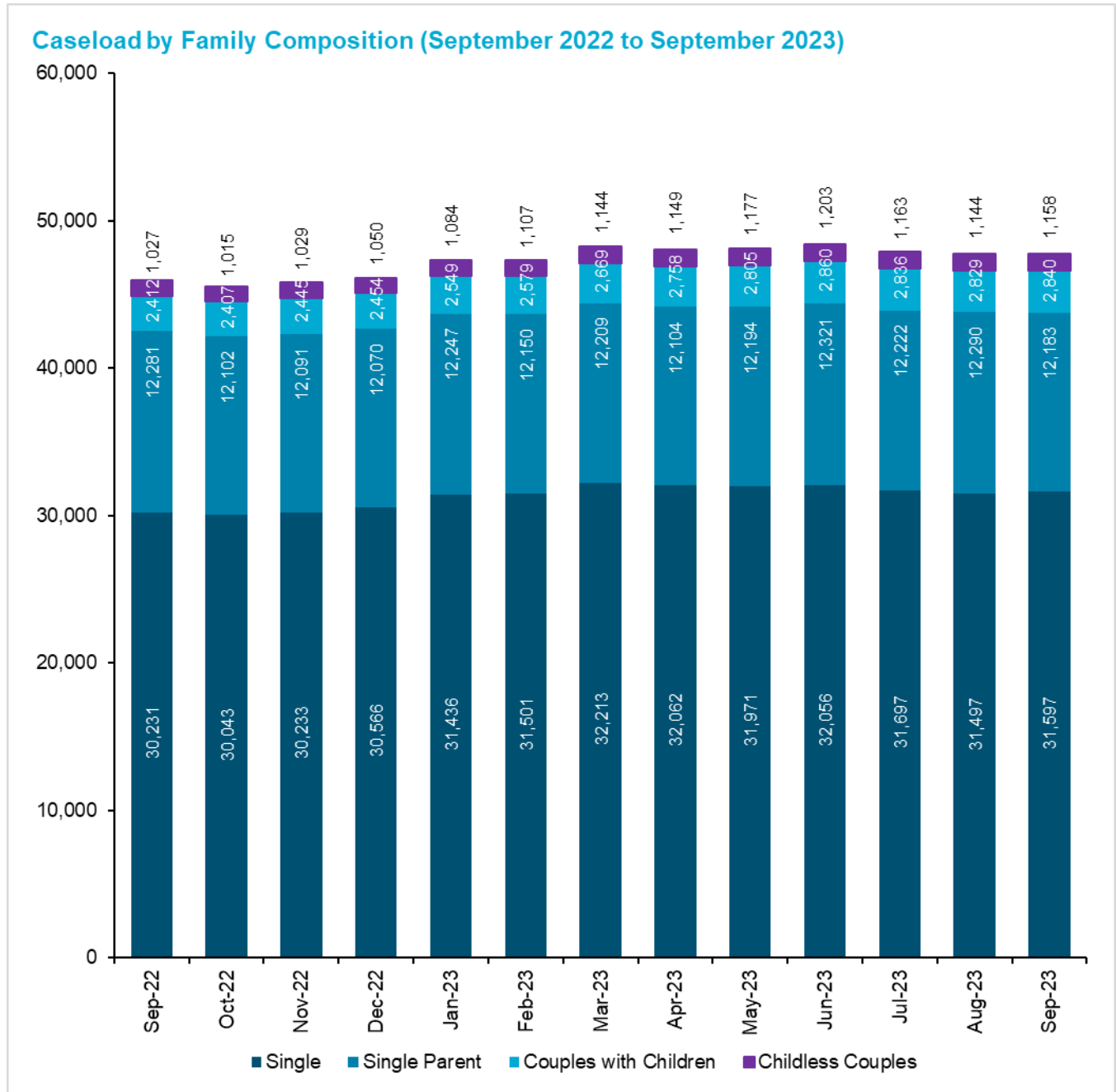
Of the ETW caseload, 7.0% were working, 62.2% were looking for work (Available for Work) and 30.7% were unable to work (Unavailable for Work).

## Caseload by Family Composition (September 2022 to September 2023) [\[back to top\]](#)

Caseload by Family Composition for September 2023 showed the highest proportion of 47,778 caseloads to be composed of single individuals 31,597 (66.1%), followed by single-parent families 12,183 (25.5%), couples with children 2,840 (5.9%), and childless couples 1,158 (2.4%).

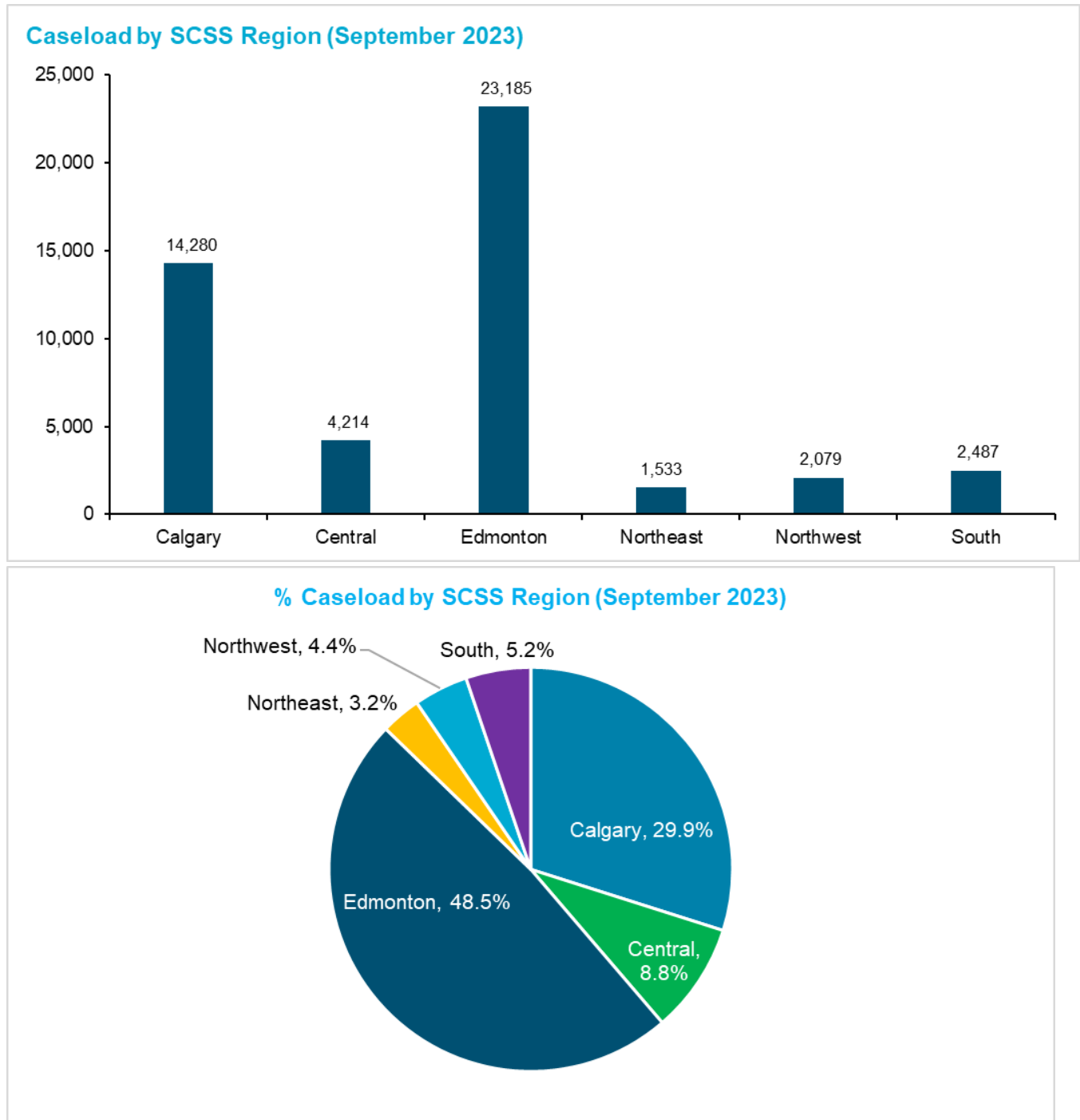

## Caseload by SCSS Region (September 2023) [\[back to top\]](#)

In September 2023, the Edmonton region saw the highest proportion of 47,778 caseloads to be 23,185 (48.5%), followed by Calgary 14,280 (29.9%), Central 4,214 (8.8%), South 2,487 (5.2%), Northwest 2,079 (4.4%), and Northeast 1,533 (3.2%).

North regions began separate reporting in September 2018. From December 2021, caseload changes, (a result of North Central Region collapsing into Northeast Region), means that we no longer report North Central data.

## Proportion Caseload by Age Group (September 2023) [\[back to top\]](#)

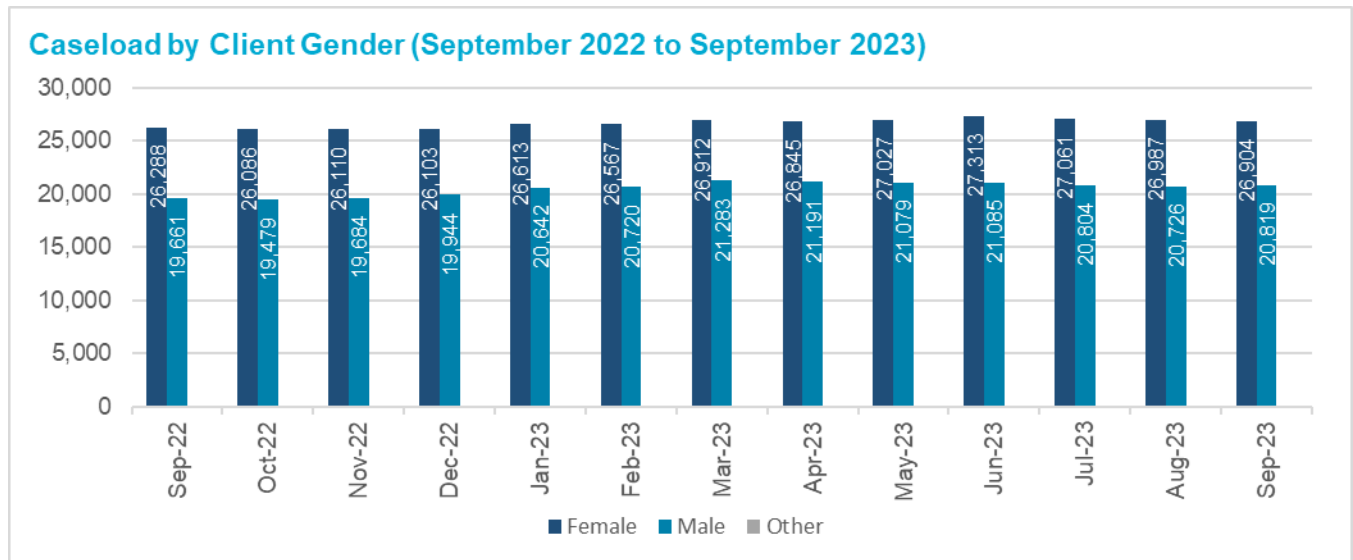
Caseload by Age Group for September 2023 showed the highest proportion of 47,778 Income Support clients were aged 35-39 years: 6,339 (13.3%), 30-34 years: 6,303 (13.2%), and 40-44 years: 6,090 (12.7%).

## Caseload by Client Gender (September 2022 to September 2023) [\[back to top\]](#)

Client Gender for September 2023 showed the higher proportion of 47,778 Income Support clients to be Female 26,904 (56.4%) followed by Male 20,819 (43.6%), and Other 54 (0.1%).
