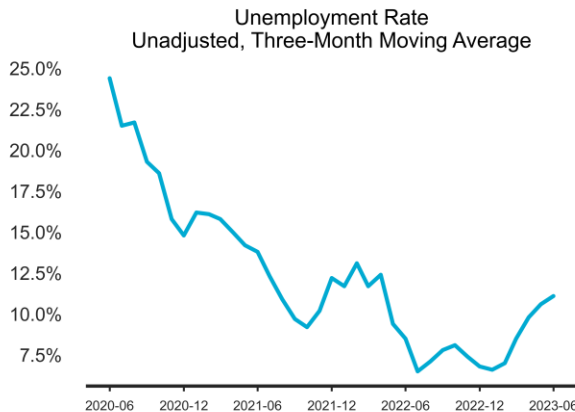


Labour Force Statistics

June 2023

Highlights: Alberta Indigenous Peoples living off reserve

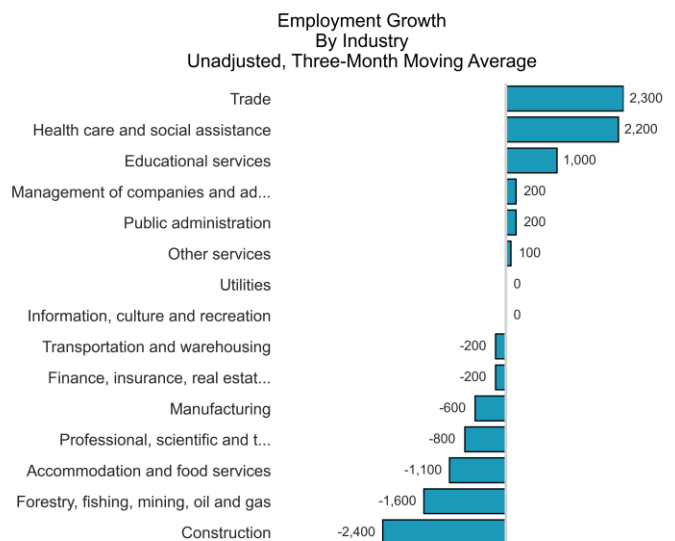
- The unadjusted three-month moving average unemployment rate for Indigenous Peoples living off reserve in Alberta was 11.1 per cent in June 2023. This is up 0.5 percentage points from May 2023 and up 2.6 percentage points from the same month last year. The national rate was 8.6 per cent, unchanged from the month before.

- The unemployment rate increased as the labour force remained the same and employment decreased by 700 from May 2023 to June 2023.
- In June 2023, the unemployment rates for First Nations and Métis people were 19.2 per cent and 5.8 per cent respectively.
- In June 2023, there were 130,699 employed Indigenous Peoples living off reserve. This represents 5.3 per cent of Alberta's overall employment. Of those employed, 101,200 were employed full-time and 29,500 were employed part-time.
- Of the 130,699 employed Indigenous Peoples living off reserve, 87,600 worked in the private sector, 30,600 in the public sector, and 12,500 were self-employed.

- In June 2023, 61.1 per cent of employment for Indigenous Peoples in the province was in the Edmonton (52,000) and Calgary (27,900) economic regions. There were 50,800 employed Indigenous Peoples in the rest of Alberta.
- Employment increased for females aged 15 to 24 years (+1,500), and males aged 25 to 54 years (+1,000). Employment shrunk for females aged 25 to 54 years (-1,800), females aged 55+ years (-1,000), and males aged 55+ years (-300). Employment was unchanged for males aged 15 to 24 years.
- The three occupations that employed the greatest number of Indigenous Peoples in June 2023 were: sales and service occupations, except management (29,200); trades, transport and equipment operators and related occupations, except management (26,500); and business, finance and administration occupations (22,200).
- Between May 2023 and June 2023, the industries with the most employment increases were: trade; health care and social assistance; and educational services.
