#### Overview:

The Other Services industry<sup>1</sup> in Alberta includes establishments and services such as:

- automotive repair and maintenance;
- electronic and precision equipment repair and maintenance;
- commercial and industrial machinery and equipment repair and maintenance;
- personal and household goods repair and maintenance;
- personal care services (i.e. hair care and esthetic services);
- funeral services;
- pet care, photofinishing and other personal services;
- religious organizations and grant-making and giving services;
- social advocacy organizations;
- civic and social organizations; and
- business, professional, labour and other membership organizations and private households.

# 2. Industry's Growth

- The Other Services industry accounted for 5.4% of total employment in Alberta in 2014.
- Employment in is this industry expected to grow at an average rate of 1.3% from 2015 to 2019<sup>4</sup>.
- The industry is expected to account for 5.3% of total employment in Alberta in 2015.

#### 3. Facts, Trends and Outlook

According to Statistics Canada's National Economic Accounts, the Other Services industry accounted for approximately 1.8% of Alberta's Gross Domestic Product in 2014, up from 1.7% in 2004. Its contribution to Alberta's total employment increased from 4.6% in 2004 to 5.4% in 2014.

Total employment (the total number of employees and self-employed people, 15 years and over) in 2014 was 6.6% higher than its level in 2013. Over the last 10 years, employment increased by 40,200 from 2004, a 49.1% increase. There were 122,100 employed in the industry in 2014, of whom 81.6% were full time and 18.4% were part time.

This calculation method also applies to the percentage of employees under union coverage and the percentage of employees working overtime per week.

According to *Alberta Occupational Demand Outlook 2013-2023*<sup>6</sup>, employment growth in the following occupations: Automotive service technicians; Technical occupations in personal service; Upholsterers, tailors, shoe repairers, jewellers; and other related occupations is expected to exceed Alberta's average rate for all occupations of 1.6%.

## 2. Demographics: Gender and Age

According to the Labour Force Survey, the gender breakdown in the Other Services industry in 2014 was as follows:

women employed: 59,900 people, or 49.1%men employed: 62,200 people, or 50.9%

Overall in Alberta, women accounted for 44.8 % and men made up 55.2% of total employment (for all industries).


